## Quick Facts

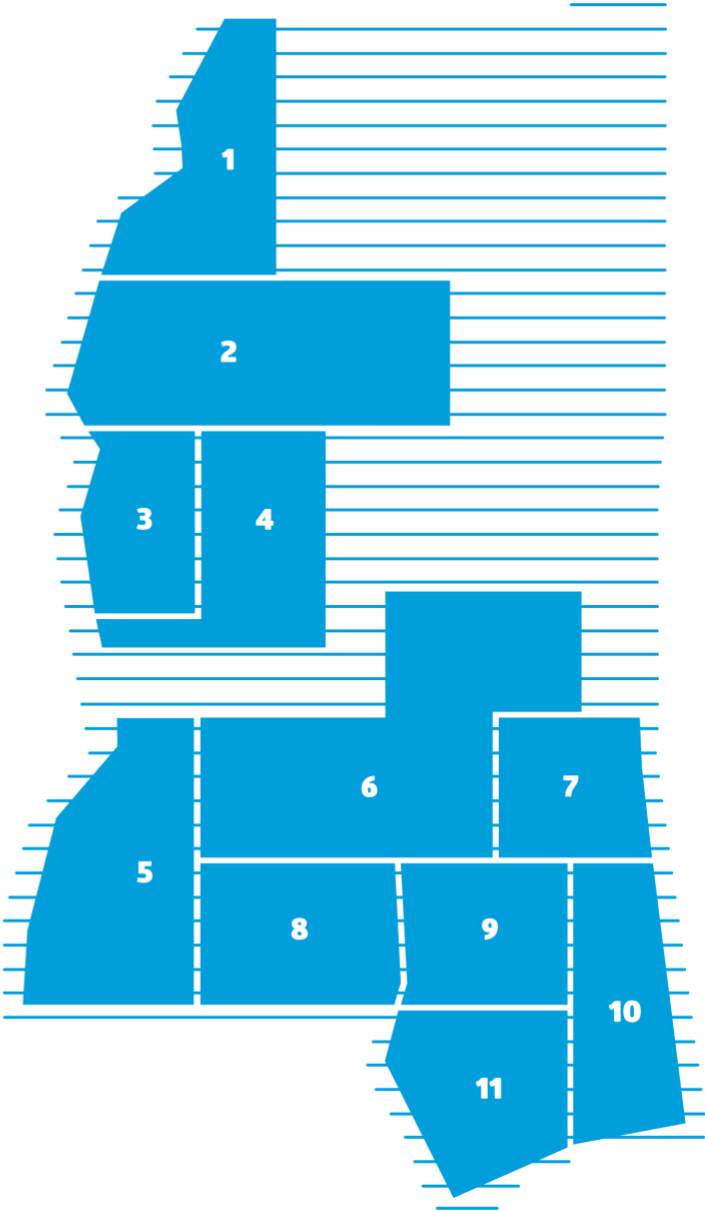

- Two combustion-turbine units
- One steam unit

#### R.D. Morrow, Sr. Generating Station

- One combined-cycle unit (future)
- Retired from coal Nov. 17, 2018\*

#### George B. Taylor Generating Station
